# MESSAGE FROM THE FOUNDER

2015 has been another outstanding year of accomplishment for Canada Company. In particular, the Military Employment Transition (MET) Program experienced an incredible year of growth, both in terms of our key metrics, and the programs and services we offer to our MET Program members. Over the course of 2015, the number of dedicated military friendly Employer Partners who engage with the MET Program has grown significantly, with over 150 Canadian businesses now a part of our coalition. We have helped 1,266 Veterans find civilian employment and with 5000 + Members signed up, we are well on our way of achieving our commitment to hire 10,000 Veterans by 2023.

Beyond our signature MET CareerConnect event, which was held in Victoria, BC and the education and transition fair in Kingston, ON, Canada Company and the MET Program have succeeded in raising greater national awareness of the challenges and opportunities of military employment transition through the inaugural National Transition Symposium. Held in Toronto on Tuesday, October 27th, Canada Company hosted our first ever National Transition Symposium which brought together 70 Employer Partners, nearly 200 Veterans, dozens of Canadian business leaders, and 30 speakers and panelists with expertise in the field of military employment transition. At a time when our men and women in uniform need the support of those they defend, the National Transition Symposium has provided a forum for discussion and innovation in military employment transition.

Canada Company continues to support the children and families of those who have made the ultimate sacrifice for our country. Over the last eight years, Canada Company has awarded 84 scholarships to the children of soldiers who lost their lives in the line of duty. Thanks to the generous support we receive from our members, the business community, and the participating schools of Project Hero, Canada Company is ensuring that funding is not a barrier to obtaining a postsecondary education for these young men and women.

When Canada Company first took the lead to administrate the LAV III Monument Program in 2014, our goal of the program was to place 250 LAV III Monuments across Canada to honour and commemorate the sacrifices made by our men and women in uniform during their Afghanistan mission. On June 19th, 2015 the Town of Oromocto and Fredericton was awarded the first prototype LAV III monument. Since then the program has received over 30 applications from across Canada.

Our success in 2015 is rooted in the dedication, passion, and commitment of our many members. Canada Company membership has grown to 580 passionate and committed members across Canada with established chapters in Quebec, Ontario, British Columbia, and Alberta.

Across Canada, we continue to have strong member engagement for all of our Chapters. We were fortunate to have Vice-Admiral Mark Norman, Commander of Canada's Navy, join us in Calgary where Canada Company members had an opportunity to discuss the future of the RCN with him. The Ottawa Chapter held another successful ski day to thank serving members and their families for all that they do, while our second The Sky is the Limit event in Toronto, at HMCS York, brought out a record number of members to view the Labour Day Airshow. The ongoing success of events both old and new is a source of great pride, as Canada Company continually strives to offer services and programs for members and Veterans alike across all of Canada, making us a truly national organization.


In Quebec, Canada Company's presence is as robust as ever. On Wednesday, July 1st, 2015, Six Flags LaRonde played host to a Military Family Day that included dignitaries such as Brigadier-General Stephane Lafaut, Commander of the 2nd Canadian Division and JTF (East) and culminated with a spectacular fireworks presentation. On October 21st, the Quebec Chapter of Canada Company held its first annual dinner at the Côte-des-Neiges Barracks. The event was an overwhelming success with more than 100 participants.

Finally, our Quebec Chapter had a transition in leadership as Steve Gregory stepped down from his role as Chapter President [although he remains a Canada Company Board Member]. My thanks go out to Steve, who has been a tireless champion of the Canada Company cause in Quebec, and who has done so much to ensure our men and women in uniform get the recognition and support they deserve. I would also like to welcome our new Quebec Chapter President, Francois Joyet, who has been involved with Canada Company since 2011, and who has been a Board Member since 2014.

We hosted or took part in a number of successful events throughout the year including: our 7th Annual Golf Tournament, Operation Collaborative Spirit held in Petawawa, and a dinner in Vancouver for Major-General Dave Wheeler, Commander of

Ist Canadian Air Division. We also had a strong presence at this year's CANSEC Conference in Ottawa, OMX's event focused on the value of partnerships in the aerospace and defence sector, held in Toronto, as well as International Women's Day. Thanks to Canada Company's staff and our Board who are dedicated to carrying out our Mission.

Reflecting on another year of successes, I cannot help but have high hopes for the future of Canada Company. We have seen military personnel and civilians alike take up our cause from coast to coast, strengthening our network of dedicated members. I would also like to extend my personal thanks to all of our Canada Company members, donors, and sponsors, who take as much pride in our cause as we do, and make it possible for Canada Company to provide the greatest possible support for our men and women in uniform.

# **Celebrating our Heroes**



# INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Accordingly, my verification of this revenue was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Organization and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenue, excess of revenue over expenditures, assets and net fund balances.

# **NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS**

**DECEMBER 31, 2015** 

#### 1. Operations and Mission

The Foundation was incorporated under the Canada Corporations Act without share capital on February 1, 2008 and began operations shortly thereafter. The Foundation is a not-for-profit organization, as described in Section 149(1)(I) of the Canadian Income Tax Act, and therefore is not subject to either federal or provincial income taxes. The mission of the Foundation is to develop unique programs assist those in the military and their families.

The preparation of these financial statements requires the use of estimates and assumptions that have been made using careful judgment. In the opinion of management, these financial statements have been properly prepared within reasonable limits of materiality and within the framework of the significant accounting policies summarized below.

#### 2. Basis of Presentation

The financial statements have been prepared using Canadian Accounting Part III Standards for not-for-profit organizations.

## Revenue Recognition:

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the principals of fund accounting, whereby the resources of the organization are classified into funds associated with specific activities of objectives. Contributions restricted for the purpose of capital assets are deferred and amortized into revenue at a rate corresponding with the amortization rate for the related capital asset. Unrestricted contributions such as membership and donations are recognized as revenue in the appropriate fund when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue when earned. The funds reflected in the financial statements are as follows:

General Fund - this fund accounts for the operations and programs as well as the organization's general operations and reflects restricted and unrestricted contributions related to this fund.

Scholarship Fund - the purpose of this fund is to support post-secondary education endeavors of the children of fallen Canadian soldiers and subject to both internally and externally imposed covenants. A third party holds and manages the fund and funding is based on an individual basis on an annual basis without a predetermined use.

Camp Fund - commencing this year, the Foundation has ceased the Camp fund and accordingly, no expected to recur in future reporting periods. Accordingly, the fund balance was transferred entirely to the general fund.

## Asset and service contributions:

Volunteers contribute a significant amount of time each year to assist the Foundation in carrying out its programs and services. Because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in these financial statements. Contribution of assets, supplies and services that would otherwise have been purchased, are recorded at their fair value at the date of contribution, provided a fair value can be reasonably determined.

## Measurement uncertainty:

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenues and expenses during the reported period. These estimates are reviewed periodically, and, as adjustments become necessary, they are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known.

#### 2. Basis of Presentation (continued)

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Accounting Standards for Not for Profit Operations require management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclose of contingent asset and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

#### 3. Related Party Transactions

During the year, the board members contributed office space, supplies and administrative staff with no cost to the Foundation. These financial statements do not reflect the value of that contribution because of the difficulty in determining fair value.

The Foundation has established a Scholarship Fund administered by a private foundation. At December 31, 2015, the fair value of the Scholarship Fund, held by the private foundation was \$ 2,560,328 (2015 - \$ 2,560,328) which includes withdrawals of \$ 94,776 to fund the scholarship awards and associated expenses.

Donation receipts totaling \$ 121,165 were issued to Board members during the year. Of this amount, the advantage benefit totals \$ 200.

## 4. Military Employment Transition Program

With a goal to provide a one-stop portal of career/employment transition resources, the Foundation established a new program during the current year. Canada Company, in partnership with the Canadian Armed Forces and Veterans Affairs Canada, has created a "one-stop-shop" web portal for all things transition, for Regular force members leaving the military, Reservists and for Veterans who have been honorably released from the CAF. This partnership assists releasing military personnel and Veterans in finding meaningful employment in the private sector. Management believes that costs of \$ 688,435 (2014 - \$ 457,921) of expenses reflected in the Statement of Operations will result in future cash inflows and can not be determined with certainty. A company controlled by the Chairman of the Foundation and a related company is reimbursed for costs paid on behalf of the Foundation at cost. These costs relate to payroll and are reimbursed quarterly.

# 5. Canada Revenue Agency Fundraising Expense Ratio

The foundation engages in fundraising to support investment in its missions. The cost of fundraising activities includes both cost, which can be directly attributed, and generally support expenses which have been allocated to the activity. The basis of allocation varies depending on the nature of expense and includes estimate of time spent, material costs, delivery costs and head counts. The Foundation has determined that its report ratio current year is 10% (2014 - 14%) and is composed of a portion of management fees, salaries and event costs directly attributable to fundraising events.

## 9. Assets held in trust

The Foundation has entered into a agreement with an third party whereby funds were sourced and donated to fund the LAV III Monument Program. During the year, funds were received and expended totaling \$82,276 relating to the delivery of a LAV III in 2016 and reported as part of Assets held in trust. Total cash held by the Foundation as at December 31, 2016 totals \$75,216.

## 10. Education Program, Materials and Promotion.

During the year, the Foundation expended \$ 256,711 in education program and materials. These costs relate to products and services to support the education and awareness programs, services and tools for the Canadian public, business leaders and members of the military for the advancement of the military employment transition program.
